# Class XXIV's first session day: Economic Development

In a whirlwind 10-hour day of speakers, PNNL tours, feverous note taking, and thought provoking questions, Tracie Cowen provided the best class ever with an impressive glimpse of what the next 10 months of learning will look like. The opening tone was set by Rick Martinez's opening discussion from *The Leadership Challenge* (Barry Posner), regarding Modeling the Way. Class members were posed with the question, "Are you leading by your values?" The class will be guided in their lives by the idea that someone can tell what your core values are by observing your leadership.

The day flew by with discussions on what economic development looks like in the Tri-Cities, and why this is important. The enthusiasm brought by these speakers for what is going on in our area was inspiring and informative, and provided a lot of information to process, share, and motivate. Through statistics in labor and marketing, the importance of tourism, transportation, and research development, many differing ideas and opinions were shared. Time and time again, speakers focused on the need for our community to function as a region instead of individual cities.

An afternoon dedicated to learning about the influence of Pacific Northwest National Laboratory and the contributions the lab makes not only to our area, but the scientific community as well, was followed by panelists discussing workforce education, small business and access to capital, which closed out a jam-packed day of wisdom. The day covered a wide range of economic influences, large corporations, individual entrepreneurs, government agencies and educators, all eager to share their piece of the puzzle and how they fit into the success of our great community.

With only 20 minutes left in the day, reflections on the day brought the class discussion back to processing the information that was shared, individual take-aways, and reiterating the poignant ideas of the day.

This is only day one, Class XXIV. It's remarkable to think about what an incredible year we have ahead of us when this is only the first day of ten.


